WHIN has made a concerted effort to support U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, BLM, Fraternity of the Desert Bighorn, Las Vegas Hunting Retriever Club and Nevada Department of Wildlife. Our efforts include the cleanup of two miles of roadway near the Pahranaagat Wildlife area, Planting shrubs and trees at Pahranaagat Wildlife Refuge, Planting trees and shrubs at the U.S. Service's Corn Creek Wildlife Refuge, Seeding the Key Pitman Wildlife Refuge.

WHIN Volunteers at the Pahranaagat highway project: Including new members Don and Jane Nash, members Greg Clark, Bill Halvorsen, Bill DeJuncker, Mark Guest, and Michael Guest. Special note: Bill Halvorsen got 11 pound of trash in a 10 pound bag.

WHIN Volunteers helped the Fraternity of the Desert Bighorn Projects Judy and Kelly: Keven Picardo, Michael Guest, Bill Halvorsen, and Bill DeJuncker. The Judy Project included building a 40' by 80' water collection device and installing (5) 2200 gallon water tanks and a drinker. The Judy project was to replace water tanks which were burned in a forest fire last year.





## PREDATOR HUNTING IN NEVADA

Predator hunting season is rapidly approaching. Coyote pups are getting bigger and will become sizeable targets by early August. They will be on their own and fending for themselves. August is still quite hot here in Nevada. You can still have success early in the morning or throughout the night. Most Predator hunters will probably wait until September or October to start calling. The earlier you start, the less educated they are. Nevada has the largest percentage of public land in the United States. You can predator hunt close to Las Vegas or as far away as Elko, depending on how far you want to drive. Las Vegas is Nevada's largest city therefore we have the most hunters. The farther you can get away from any big city the better your success rate will be.

Most predator hunters own a battery operated calling device. This is the preferred choice by most. If you are one of those hunters, and you have found that your success rate has dwindled in the last couple of years, you may want to purchase a few mouth calls and learn how to use them. I will almost guarantee that your success rate will increase if they are used correctly. There are a lot of brands on the shelves and all of them will work.

When you are in the field there are several things you can do to become more successful.

1. Use your surroundings and wind direction to your advantage.
2. Carry a shotgun to every stand.
3. Change up your calling sequence or sounds if they are not working.
4. When walking to a stand, walk softly and crouch down when sky lighting yourself.
5. Make sure your vehicle is not visible from any routes that the predator may take when coming to the stand.
- 6 Do not cross into any washes or lanes where coyotes may respond from, as your scent will deter them from coming in.
7. Use a motion decoy.
8. The night before you plan to hunt, drive the area and howl every mile or so. Make a note where you get responses and call those areas the next day.
